





## **CSBG**



# CSBG spent \$69,733.38 in 2023 helping 179 households.

The Community Service Block Grant (CSBG) is a federally funded program that helps alleviate the causes and conditions of poverty. We help with rent, mortgage, and utility payments as well as some medical, dental, car repair, and home repair costs.

Currently, this income-qualified program offers families a maximum grant of \$1,000 once in five years paid directly to vendors.






